SHELAA reference and comments (if any)	LE109 SDNP 2016 SHLAA – site rejected Medium Landscape Sensitivity - Whilst the site is relatively well contained it is sensitive to dense housing development which would appear incongruous and unconnected to the surrounding settlement pattern. High density roof patterns and built form would be visible in wider views from nearby PROW and would appear incongruous with surrounding development at the settlement edge. Development on the site would have a potential adverse impact on the character and appearance of the landscape.

Suitability	Access to the site is very tight, currently only possible from within the golf club. Firle Road is too narrow to allow turning off into the site unless there is significant loss of mature hedging and a line of trees. The owner envisages a development comprising 5 or 6 one or two storey dwellings on the Firle Road frontage. They believe a frontage development could reasonably be regarded as "infill" between the two substantial sets of buildings fronting that side of Firle Road.
