Adders aren't on it currently. This is an important species at Seaford Head and can be considered an indicator species. Limited amount of orchids mentioned, including fragrant and pyrimidal.

Chalk grassland fails to mention pony grazing, which is very effective at removing Torr Grass. No mention of scrub removal which is one of the main threats to chalk grasslands. The Moon Carrot at Seaford Head is currently at risk of dissapearing over the edge and due to wind directions will not naturally disperse, so will need active intervention to keep the population. Kittiwakes: there is no mention of protection of food source, though appreciate this would sit outside the area but still is a major influence

on their success.
"Create and improve management of species rich grassland" seems quite vague, things like reduced cuts, cut and collect would create favourable habitats, maybe should make clear that verges are considered part of this.

Local Habitat Map

- Measures maps these identify locations where our measures could be carried out to deliver the greatest benefit to biodiversity and/or the wider environment.
- The ACIB: Areas that could be important for biodiversity any measures mapped outside of the APIB

Please note, while all the measures in the East Sussex and Brighton & Hove LNRS are valuable and beneficial for nature, not all of them are mappable. More than 50% of our measures are not mappable, in the main because a) we have insufficient data to map them accurately, b) we lack a clear rationale for mapping them or c) they could be implemented in a vast number of locations e.g. installing nesting boxes or wildflower strips. The SSSI at Seaford Head Local Nature reserve is not marked up to enhance chalk grassland, however, there is a huge opportunity here as the site is currently in declining due to scrub encroachment.

High and Over is marked for Enhance other priority woodland, 'till relatively (we believe 1950s) recently this was good species rich grassland. Although there is an opportunity to create better woodland here (which we're looking into), there is also potentially good species rich grassland if a lot of work was done.

Seaford Town Council (STC) note an area of land in STC's ownership to the side of Chyngton Brooks is highlighted for Renaturalise rivers and floodplains, STC would like to know more about what could be done here, Chyngton Brooks itself seems more of an opportunity yet is not mapped.

For "increase habitat in existing greenspaces", STC note The Crouch, the Salts and the Martello Fields (including the pump field) have not been highlighted, these are all in STC ownership and some work has already been undertaken to improve these areas, however, there are still more opportunities, these also are some of the more significant green spaces in Seaford. Separate from STC's land, STC would like to comment that the North Brooks part of SSCP (north of the A259) feels like an area that has huge potential and has not been highlighted under wetlands and standing waterbodies or rivers streams etc. STC previously managed Seven Sisters Country Park and always thought there was a huge opportunity to improve this area.
